Assignment briefing and mapping to unit:

Examination: one and a half hours

You may take your copy of the novel *Jane Eyre* into the examination but it should not be annotated.

Answer two of the following questions, one from Section A and one from Section B.

Section A: characterisation (ACs 5.1 and 5.2)

- 1 Analyse Jane's relationships with Helen Burns, Miss Temple and the Rivers sisters. Evaluate what kinds of role models they offer Jane in terms of how a woman might live her life?
- 2. Mr Brocklehurst, Helen Burns and St John Rivers represent three possible approaches to religion. Analyse how these characters are used in the novel in relation to the significance of religion for Jane. Evaluate what she learns from each of them?

Tips for Section A: consider how factors such as direct description, dialogue, symbolism, parallels and doubling, all contribute to the creation and significance of the characters under consideration

Section B : critical perspectives (ACs 6.1 and 6.2)

- 1. Re-read the unexpected encounter on the road which takes place between Jane and Mr Rochester and their first meeting at Thornfield. Evaluate how Psychoanalytical, Feminist and Marxist critical perspectives can help the reader to understand this central relationship in the novel. What is the significance of the setting, weather and atmosphere in this first encounter? How does Bronte establish the relationship for the reader and how is the sexual chemistry between them conveyed? What part does their social inequality play in the developing relationship? (AC 6.1 and 6.2)
- 2. Evaluate the usefulness of both feminist and postcolonial critical perspectives in terms of the portrayal of Bertha Mason. To what extent is the fact that she is a woman of Creole heritage from Jamaica relevant to her portrayal and significance in the novel? (AC 6.1 and 6.2).
